**COMING TRIPS:**

April 28<sup>th</sup>: Deerford Track: A moderately easy track (Deerford) leads up a spur through bush and leatherleaf and on to the snow grass of Toka (5006ft.). The open tops of the Ngamoko Range run north-east from here, containing numerous side spurs, low peaks and tarns. The return route will follow a spur down to Cone and then down Cone Creek to the road. Leader: Keith Potter 79.499 (approx. \$1.00).

May 11 - 12<sup>th</sup>: Desert Road - Waihohonu Hut:

This trip is an easy five mile walk over flat tussock country and is a must for all club members. The hut is beautifully situated on the side of a beech forest. In the vicinity of the hut there is a spring of very cold, clear, bubbling water of approx 30 yards by 12 yards. Views to be seen include red and other coloured Tama

Lakes, Ngauruhoe, Ruapehu and Mount Tama. The hut sleeps twelve comfortably and there are plenty of good tent sites in the area.
