The course will be held in a vast stand of privately owned native bush that extends out from the State Forest, 50 miles from the city. The camp site is about a ¾ hour tramp from the road. Take normal overnight gear including sleeping bag cover, Ongaonga Map NZMS 1 N140, Bushcraft Manual, torch & compass. Extra compasses will be provided. Do not purchase one especially for this course. If possible take these items: Polythene sheet 6 ft. X 9 ft. (5 thou. Thick), pieces of twine or cord totalling 20 ft. (or more), 12 yards of 100H nylon rope (or hemp), sheath knife.

26<sup>th</sup>-27<sup>th</sup> August. CONSERVATION EXERCISE.

Over three thousand trees were planted in the Oroua Valley during the weekend. Areas planted bordered onto those planted this time last year. Of the radiata pines and popular cuttings planted last year no more than half a dozen were seen to have died -- if we get the same results this time there will be a real forest up there. I have never seen so many trees planted so much loving care and precision.

Permission to use a wool shed at the end of Table Flat Road was gained from the owner, Mr. D. Paterson, who gave us a bag of two dozen eggs when we called in to see him on the way in on Saturday. Chris Coe, the Forestry Field Officer for the area, was waiting for their for us. After dumping our gear on the wool shed we watched Chris give a 'demo' on the correct method of planting the trees. Buckling on a planting bag each we fill them with trees, picked up a grubber (one experienced tree planter was actually observed selecting a decrepit, the short bladed BUT LIGHT grubber -- such manners, with older members present!) and moved off down to the planting area. Two thirds of the trees were planted this day.

For the evening meal we split voluntarily into three groups and before long three self appointed chefs (the Whitehead, Neill, Dench Consortium), accompanied by an assortment of servants were seen hovering over their great steaming pots of mouth watering delicacies. Lighting effects for this great event, which was carried out in an old whare near the wool shed, was provided by Messrs. Stretton & Johnson Ltd. (Very limited!) With various parts from the cars enough light was available for the talks to see what they were cooking but not what you were eating! And the words of Sir Windstill, Downhill, "Never before in the annals of camp

cooking has so much been cooked for so many by so few!" The hours until sunrise were spent playing cards, stalking unseen possums and sleeping.
