Entries in Hut Log Books.

Hut log books serve three purposes: They provide information in the event of a Search and Rescue incident, they (provide) interesting topographical, historical and personal information. The first purpose is the most important. If the correct details are given much valuable time (and may be lives) can be saved. Remember, even if nothing happens to your party, your log book entry could be of help in the search for some other less competent party. Suppose you visit some hut. Unknown to you, another party is also meant to be going to the hut. Sometime later, the second party is reported overdue. A search party finds your entry in the log book. The Club is contacted. Did you see the other party, what were they wearing, what was the weather like, was the river flooded?

The second purpose, of advertising and promoting the Club, will only be fulfilled if your actions and behaviour reflect well on the Club. If the hut is left dirty, if your trip is badly organised or if your route finding is abysmal the Club's name will not be promoted.

The third purpose of log books is that they provide an interesting record. When was I last here? What diverse places have others come from or gone to? Is there a direct route to the back-of-beyond?

A correct log book entry includes the time and date or day, where you have come from and where you are going to plus details of route if this is not obvious. Details of weather and the state of the rivers, the existence of snow etc., should be mentioned if they are noteworthy or likely to affect your trip. Similarly illness or injury should be mentioned. If that is a club trip head up your entry with the Club's name otherwise include your club affiliations alongside your name. Keep your entry brief, free from obscenities and grizzles. If the hut is dirty, clean it, don't just complain about it. Your actions will speak louder than long arrogant or boastful log book entries.

Police Station List of Names

From time to time Club parties have been late returning from trips. During the eight years of the clubs existence the reasons for late return have been diverse but never serious. Nevertheless, parents and spouses worry over the non-return of loved ones. In the past

Club Officials have been embarrassed by not knowing who has gone on a trip. Arrangements have been made for trip leaders to leave a list of names and phone numbers at the Police Station immediately before the trip leaves. It is important that the list contains the name and phone number of a responsible Club Official for the Police to contact after a certain time should the list not be collected. Even more important, the responsible Club Official should first be advised before his name is used. (Who wants to be run up in the middle of the night about a trip you know nothing about?)

Do not forget to call at or phone the Police Station upon your return. If you are seriously delayed for any reason, contact the Club Official on your list as early as possible.

### PAST EVENTS

#### SAREX

Over recent months Club Members have been involved in a number of Search and Rescue Exercises.

In April the Club held an instruction course in the Police Station. It was designed for those new to SAR and drew an attendance of about 15 persons.

In May, Kevin Pearce, Tim Short, Trevor Bissell and Glen Dixon took part in the Palmerston North Police District annual exercise. This took the form of a day of classroom and outdoor work and a one-day mock search. The exercise was held near Woodville in a shearing shed and shearers quarters and in the Coppermine Creek.

More recently Tim Short and Kevin Pearce took part in the Wellington District annual exercise held in the Northern Taranaki. This was a two day mock search held in rough country and stormy weather.

The difference in style between the Wellington and Palmerston exercises was marked. The former tend to be realistic (arduous) imitations of the real thing while the latter are far more instructional in nature. The success of the Wellington method is very dependent on the calibre of the instructors who are assigned to each team. However, the Palmerston North system could give some search volunteers a rude shock when they become aware of the hard work and the rigorous weather that sometimes has to be faced.

Generally it could be said that it has been a good season for SAREX.

#### 3<sup>rd</sup>-4<sup>th</sup> MAY POHANGINA -- TAMAKI CROSSING
