PAST EVENTS

4th-5th February A MAIN RANGE S.K.

The odd wink of torch light to the north may or may not be Kevin and Keith. Paul Richardson of the Wellington Tramping and Mountaineering Club appears and states that he did not get away from Putara Hut until 4.30 a.m. He disappears south along the Dundas Ridge. Our party dribbles onto East Peak in ones and twos. A bright full moon provides nearly all the light one needs for walking. Keith and Kevin arrive bringing daylight with them. Torches are shoved into very light packs and we are moving again.

This is the ego trip of the Tararuas, Schorman's Track to Kaitoke – nearly the whole length of the range in a weekend. At least 10 people are doing S.K's this weekend and seven of these belong to our club. A husband and wife team from the W.T.M.M.C. left Putara last night and have camped somewhere along the ridge. We catch up with them on Walker.

At Arete Tarn Ross decides to go with the main group via the Greater Northern Crossing to Holdsworth and thence via Totara Flats, Cone Saddle and the Tauherenikau River. We give Ross the 'dehy, fruit and instant pudding' and half of the Meuseli and keep the T.V.P. stew ourselves. He will be able to balance his diet by sharing his food with the others.

Kevin and Keith are carrying cold food only and Keith has no sleeping bag! Kevin lends his water bottle to the Main Range group and we part company.

Saturday was a long hot day and much liquid was drunk at Dracophyllum Bivvy, Nichols Hut and Andersons Memorial Hut. We watch the sun going down and the moon rising to take its place while descending Aokaparangi. The lights of Otaki and those of Masterton appear. Walking becomes a little tricky until the moon has risen a little above the horizon. Maungahuka Hut at 10 p.m. looks good to us. We have had an 18 hour day. Paul Richardson has been here since 7.30 p.m.!

The main party reached Powell Hut at 6 p.m. On Sunday Keith and Julian went out to Holdsworth Lodge and hitched-hiked back to Palmerston North. Kevin, Ross and Alan continued south via the rivers to Kaitoke, got a lift into Upper Hutt and returned home on the Wairarapa Railcar. Their total walking time for the weekend was 26 hours.

On Sunday Peter and Trevor continued along the Main Range to Vosseler Hut, took the Southern Crossing to Alpha Hut and accompanied Paul Richardson down the Marchant Ridge to Kaitoke. They missed the railcar at Upper Hutt but returned home in style on the Silver Star from Wellington. Their total walking time was 32 hours.



PRESIDENT'S REPORT (YEAR ENDED 28/3/77)

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the eleventh Annual Report of the Palmerston North Tramping & Mountaineering Club.

Although with a present membership of 46 our club is smaller than it has been for some years we ran at least 23 day trips and 40 weekend or longer trips during the year. Members averaged 9 trips per year each. In addition to our favourite stamping grounds, namely the Tararua and Ruahine Ranges, the club visited the Kaimanawas, the Tongariro National Park, Egmont and Lake Waikaremoana. Members of the Club tramped and climbed in the Seaward Kaikouras, South Westland, Mt. Cook National Park and Mt. Aspiring National Park.

Social events included the 'Grande Annual Dinner' at Rangi Hut, the annual slide competition and a 'Gourmet Dinner' with the Wellington Tramping and Mountaineering Club in the Eastern Ruahines. Our debating team energetically supported the proposition that "Trampers use the hills as an excuse for grubbiness" but were defeated by the Massey University Alpine Club debating team who claimed that trampers needed no excuse to be grubby anyway.

During the year the club gave instruction on rockclimbing, snowcraft, bushcraft, river crossing and on the various skills required for Search and Rescue. Members took part in S.A.R. exercises at Camp Peak and Walls Whare and took part in a search for the pilot of a light aircraft which crashed in the Tararuas near the Pahiatua Track Road.

The Club has felt the effect of rising costs. In addition to the raising of subscriptions at last year's A.G.M. Club spending during the year was held to a minimum. The registration of the newsletter as a magazine greatly reduced postage costs. No winter and summer fixture cards were printed this year. Instead three monthly trip schedules were printed with the newsletter at a fraction of the cost. We hope to be in a position to purchase new tent flies in the coming year. The joint P.N.T.M.C./M.U.A.C. song book "Trudge" was finally received from the printers and paid for early this year. This money will be recovered from song book sales.

I wish to record my thanks to the members of the committee and our auditor. In addition to the work associated with the newsletter, the club gear, the trip schedules and the appointing of trip leaders, our Club is becoming more involved in the politics of the multiple use of the Tararuas and Ruahines. Possible hydroelectricity and water storage dams with associated roading have been proposed for most of the major rivers in the Tararuas. The Club has already opposed one such scheme through the Office of the Commission for the Environment. Problems of continued access to parts of the ranges still exist and we should concern ourselves to a greater extent with track, route and hut policies in the ranges.

Let me thank all who have helped run the club and who have gone on trips during the year.
