## 7. GRADING OF TRIPS

All Club trips are graded according to difficulty. Generally this is done on the basis of the time it would take a fit trumper to do the proposed trip. Usually the actual number of walking hours is often slower than that of the hypothetical fit trumper. Also weather conditions can cause marked changes in the difficulty of trips. Consequently trip gradings must be considered only as a rough guide as to the probable difficulty of a trip. If you go on a trip which begins to seem as if it might be too tough for you, please advise the Leader. On no account push yourself to the point of exhaustion, and conceal the fact that you are doing this.

## 8. A PLEA FROM THE EDITOR

DOWN SOUTH IN JANUARY

Two members of our Club and two others, spent four weeks in January tramping from the Waitaroa River in Westland to the Tasman glacier in Canterbury. The trip took a round-about route via the Perth River – Scone Creek – Sealy Pass – Godley Glacier – Grey Glacier and Pass – North Butler River – Whataroa River – Whymper glacier and Pass – Murchison Glacier and the Tasman Saddle and Glacier.

SOUTHERN CROSSING – ANZAC WEEKEND

Rain, strong wind, hail and mist. What more cold you ask for on a Southern Crossing of the Tararua Ranges?

Our party of four began its trip on Friday night tramping up to Field’s Hut in the dark and arrived at 11 p.m. After a troubled night’s sleep, listening to rats scratching and three morons singing Fred Dagg songs etc. we awoke to make a 9.15 a.m. start, arriving at Vosseler Hut in time for lunch.

Mt. Hector was the highest point of our trip (5016 ft.) and the view would have been magnificent if we could have seen through the murk. After a photo at the Tramping Clubs War Memorial and some snowball fighting between Colin and Anne, we moved along the open tops battling against strong wind and hail.

It was a very weary party that descended to Alpha Hut just after 4 p.m. but we soon livened up after a fire was lit. After a meal, we retired early with the fly tent over us to avoid being dripped upon from the leaks in the roof. Due to the strong wind keeping us awake during the night and steady rain in the morning, it was decidedly difficult to remove ourselves from our sleeping bags, so it was after 10 a.m. before we started our tramp to Bull Mound, then dropping steeply down to the Tauherenikau River for a quick lunch.

After a quick look at Cone Hut (which looked as though it had come straight from a fairy tale) we made our way to the Waiohine River. After Anne had shown us that the single wire bridge (with two wires at shoulder height for handholds) could be crossed, I gingerly crossed with trembling knees, followed by Don also with trembling knees and then Colin, who did a small dance half way across.

We intended to stay the night at Walls Whare but decided that the two fly tents should be utilized after having carried them across the width of the Tararua Ranges, so we selected a nice site under the pine trees where we prepared a slap-up 3 course meal of chipolatas, fondu-style, dipped in cheese and apple cider followed by the inevitable stew and pineapple chunks with instant pud. Later in the evening we took up an invitation from a School teacher with 8 pupils to tea and popcorn at Walls Whare. Back under our fly we finally wafted off to sleep to the sound of light rain. On Monday we made our way out to Grewtown and then home.

We finally arrived at Powell Hut at 12.45 p.m. where a hot drink and lunch were had. Left the hut at 1.40 p.m. and had a fast trip back down to the car after navigating all of the formidable barriers along the way.

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STORM GEAR

From time to time Club trips are advertised as requiring "storm gear". In fact all tramping trips going above the bush line require "storm gear." What is "storm gear?"

Storm gear includes the following: Parka, overtrousers, overmitts, woolen singlet, shirt, trousers (long johns), mittens and balaclava. In short a layer of wool and a layer of waterproof over the entire body, except the face. (Jeans are not suitable.) the parka must be in good repair, waterproof, coming well down the thighs, sleeves coming well past the wrists, hood large enough to cover the chin and forehead. Many experienced trampers now carry two parkas – a light weight inner parka and a heavy weight outer parka. The light weight parka can be used on its own when it's windy or if conditions are not too severe.

Storm gear also includes a waterproof sleeping bag cover and a closed cell foam mat. Search and rescue teams always carry full storm gear unless they are told otherwise when they are called out.
