TRIP REPORTS:

Feb 6 – Waitangi Day

The club entered 2 teams in this competition which was run by the Rose City and P.N.J.C's at the Awapuni Racecourse.

February 16 - 17 – Northern Crossing

After many years of training they were nearly ready for it; the apprenticeship was almost over. The ladies were prepared to attempt the arduous Northern Crossing and hence become eligible for the coveted token male awards.

The plan was to cross from East to West, starting at the Kiriwhakapapa Road end – over the Blue Range – down to Cow Creek – up to Table Ridge – along Tarn Ridge – over Arete and Pukematawai – out the Ohau River.

After the Bissell/Seebeck "tourmobile" (there will be a collection at the next club meeting to raise funds to pay for plugging the holes in the Bissell van exhaust system!!) dropped us off we had a nice evening sauntering up an unusually dry track to Blue Range Hut. A quick inspection of the water supply revealed an extremely dead bird floating in a pool of 'extremely alive' maggots! The next drink was thoroughly boiled!

We got a reasonably early start from the hut and made our way along the winding track to Cow Creek. The long dry summer had caused the tracks to be extremely dry – a real pleasure especially for those of us in running shoes (tight budget this year).

Down at Cow Creek Hut the real work was about to begin! A couple of hours and many metres later it was over. Now it was on to the tops with views of Mitre and all the peaks to the North and South – or was it! As we climbed onto Table Ridge the mist descended to meet us and the visibility dropped to 10 metres. Those rolls of sweaty summer flab were quickly covered with wool and parkas. The Tararua Gods then decided to help us on our way with some cool easterly breezes – strange folk these guardians of the ranges – they must have thought we were going too slow – ‘cos they kept blowing harder and harder!

Daryl and I played at being navigators – juggling maps and compasses and pronouncing the route to be "that way" (which was fairly obvious anyway as the track went that way).

We reached Tarn Ridge Hut at about 3.30 p.m. and began to dry out. Enraged because we had stopped playing their game the gods howled and cried all night long.

Come morning we were having serious doubts about the ability of the meteorologists to accurately forecast the weather. We were all fairly certain that the Friday evening weather maps consisted of anti-cyclones. However, reality was quite different. We emerged from the cocoon of Tarn Ridge Hut in all our winter storm gear – so much for summer tramping.

Apart from a short pitch of crawling on all fours the trip to Pakematawai was uneventful. We finally emerged out of the mist on the ridge down to Te Matawai Hut. The bush gave some very welcome shelter from the wind and we quickly made our way down to the South Ohau Hut (presently being completely renovated by the Levin-Waiopahu Club).

Travel down the Ohau River was swift and before long we burst out onto the farmland. The farmhouse at the end of the road was empty, so we set off down the road. After five minutes, Perry Hicks arrived swiftly and carried us all back to Palmerston North.
