TRIP REPORTS:

ABORTA -CONTORTA 23 - 24 March

For those who don't know, Pinus contorta is an introduced tree, which has become a pest in parts of the central North Island. Some benighted individual planted some in the Kariori forest in the 1930's; from there, it has flourished and spread into the southern sections of Tongariro National Park, where it shades out and kills the native vegetation if left unchecked. (It's not much fun for tramping through, either!) Every year tramping clubs have the opportunity of sending work parties on the eradication programme, without which the southern flanks of Ruapehu would become smothered with this tenacious, worthless plant.

This year our club sent a party of 21, who travelled up on Friday night to SixCross Camp, just off the Desert Road Summit. There we were accommodated in large army tents with (luxury of luxuries) camp stretchers – quite comfortable. The rest of the camp's amenities were pretty basic; nowhere to sit down to eat, and communal toilets, 6 seats in a row (with no partitions) and only an open slatted gate at either end – presumably to stop the sheep from wandering in.'

On Saturday and Sunday under the supervision of ex-club-member Karyn Bishop (now working for the park board), we were driven to the Whangaehu River in an army truck, from whence we had an hour's walk to the work area – a gully and associated ridge covered in little green pines. We then proceeded to attack these with all means available – slashers, loppers, chainsaw or just hard pulling. The weather was superb, which certainly helped the enthusiasm. The result of the combined efforts of our group and 13 from the Waikata T.C. was a gully cleared of living trees, strewn with the felled trees left as a warning to others!
