Helicopters are used a lot for search and rescue purposes. That may sound like a great way to travel but there are certain dangers in getting in and out of helicopters. The following six points are provided by A.C.C., Civil Aviation and the New Zealand Police:

1. Watch the pilot -follow his/her directions.
 2. Approach from the front.
 3. Approach from the downhill side.
 4. Blinded by dust? Crouch and wait.
 5. Board a hovering helicopter slowly - one person at a time.
 6. Secure all clothing, equipment, etc.

## TRIP REPORTS

### **11<sup>th</sup> February - Stanfield Hut**

Eight of us got off from Palmerston North in ideal tramping weather, neither torrential rain or blazing heat. Leaving the cars parked before the last creek at the road end we set off up Holmes Ridge behind "Dauntless Dennis" with a brief rest at the top for the leader to catch up! An easy ramble through regenerating bush along the ridge top found us in a delightful grassy clearing, with a view of the ranges, for morning tea.

The track down to the river is rather overgrown with cutty grass, hook grass and "certica ferox" saplings which we managed to avoid.

At Stanfield Hut a long, lazy lunch hour was had by all - except Dennis who chased birds further up the valley. Since winter flooding the track, which used to meander from the hut to the base of the ridge track, has merged with the river bed together with many fallen trees.

A pleasant splash down the river - Kim managed to get wetter than most (or was she pushed?) - ended with a cuppa in the carpark.

### **"MOUNTAINEER OF THE MONTH"**

Aleister Crowley gained both fame and notoriety as a mountaineer in the European Alps and Himalayas early this century. He was a self-confessed anarchist, a "wild" Irishman known for his frequent bouts of violent behaviour as much as for his mountaineering achievements.

Crowley reached over 6000m on the first serious attempt on K2 during 1902. That expedition possibly had the potential to succeed, but was fraught with social problems, culminating in a violent armed struggle on the brink of a precipice! (Yes, Crowley carried a pistol!).

He apparently was seldom on friendly terms with his fellow expedition members! Indeed, of one of his fellows, Crowley wrote: " He would bend over his plate, and, using a knife and fork like the blades of a paddlewheel, would churn food into his mouth with a rapid rotary motion".

The Puritan London press of the time accused Crowley of; obscene attacks on the King, pagan orgies, blasphemy, obscenity, indecency, stealing, cannibalism, kidnapping, blackmail, and unspeakable crimes. They named him "the Great Beast 666, and, on his death in 1947, as "the wickedest man in the world".
