The club plans to run an extended "tramping and climbing spotlight" based around the Hopkins Valley, at the head of Lake Ohau in the South Island. (Lake Ohau is the next lake south of Mt Cook's Lake Pukaki.) Huxley lodge is booked for 3 nights, with people arriving on Sunday 15th. (Run by Twizel School, the cost is \$11 pppn.) Find your own way south. You can drive to the lodge. Otherwise Twizel is on the main bus route, with services from/to Christchurch and elsewhere. Transport can then be arranged if necessary to the lodge.

The next couple of days can be spent on day trips, relaxing, fishing, whatever. Then Terry will be taking a 5-6 day Temple, Sth Huxley, Nth Huxley, Broderick Pass and back tramp (Grade M/F). Then he plans to run a climbing

trip for another week. There is unlimited scope to do your own thing for other tramps of various grades; a shorter Nth to Sth Temple circuit; up the Hopkins and into the Elcho valley, the Dassler Pinnacles on the Newman Range, or just camping up valley, etc. Terry has lots of info for ideas. TRIP REPORTS

Huntermville Lakes, Longview Hut, Howletts / Otumore

10 Jul - Huntermville lakes by Richard Lockett

The assembled party set off shortly after 9am and headed north out into the wilderness of the Leary farming empire which is positioned in the middle reaches of the Turakina river catchment.

After a steady climb we reached a high point roughly in the middle of the farm where Malcolm pointed out the boundaries of the property and out north the two lakes which we were to visit. Staying high up on the ridge we headed west and onto the neighbouring property at which point ***an amazing spectacle was to be seen, possibly the highlight of the trip for Malcolm, watching Neil attempt to climb over the standard Kiwi eight wire fence*** but

with the top wire being of the barbed variety. Not a pretty sight. I for one had visions of Buck Shelford playing on, in spite of injury's received.

Dropping off the ridge brought us to the edge of lake Ngaruru a popular duck shooting location judging by the amount of Maimai's present. A short walk through pine forest brought us to Lake Namunamu, which has legal walking access off the Turakina valley road and with an area of 70 acres popular for boating and water skiing for those who ask the farmer. Lunch was taken on a small wharf appointed with table and chairs suitable for the purpose.

A shower of rain had us up and back into the pines on a slow wander up and down the hills along the eastern boundary amongst squalls of wind and rain to reach Mangahoe road. It still being early afternoon Malcolm suggested

a side trip to a bush reserve 2 km's along the road Laird's bush reserve. Forest and bird have an interest in it, an original bush block in a sheltered gully beautiful tall straight trees saved for us all by the first European farmer who could see something special in this gully.

Whist checking out the bush Edith had collected the farm ute so that we could visit lake Maungaratanui which is sited on Malcolm's and Edith's other farm further down Mangahoe road
