TRIP REPORTS

Ruahine Ramble, Huxley Lodge, Nichols Hut, Iron Gates Gorge

Ruahine Ramble - Jan 5-8 By Martin Lawrence

Warren's Mission Statement for this trip was to have a summery ramble in a pleasant corner of the Ruahines. With that in mind, and the fact the weather forecast was "interesting", we convened in Peter's lounge and re-focussed on Lake Colenso rather than the original plan which was to involve heading out from Table Flat and ending up in the Sawtooth Ridge area. The new plan had us heading up the Mokai Patea then down to Lake Colenso. We would then loop back via Maropea Forks.

I was pleased that there was a bit of cloud as we slogged up the open Mokai Patea Ridge. In a dell on the other side we discovered a large and tasty looking mushroom, which we picked for an entrée that night. We thought that the beech forest heading down to Iron Bark Hut was in particularly good shape. After Iron Bark a considerable amount of peasized hail fell, which then turned to rain just after we arrived at the hut. The day was warm though, and it was an excellent walk past some interesting limestone formations. Day Two dawned great and we had a few photo ops of the lake as we headed steeply up and over towards the Unknown Campsite. Some of this track, and walk downstream was a little rugged. Once we reached the days high point of Puketaramea, we were astonished to see a large amount of fresh snow down Sawtooth Ridge way. So our Plan A would have been chilly. As we descended steeply to Maropea Forks we frightened two deer on the large slip just above the Forks.

We were back up that hill the next day for a shortish walk to Otukota Hut. The snow down South appeared to have gone. That night we rapidly turned off my white spirits cooker as we noticed a fuel leakage. The cooker was fairly new but the O-ring had perished, apparently not a common thing, but in future I think I'll take the spare ring with me.

We were out before lunch on the final day so we checked out the excellent views of the Rangitikei from the road and had lunch while we watched people setting up for a bungy bounce. Thanks Warren, this was an excellent walk, that some of hadn't been to for some time, and in my case not at all. Apart from Warren we were Peter Wiles and Anne and Martin Lawrence.

We were camped on the tops about halfway between Angle Knob and McGregor, enjoying a beautiful sunset and looking at Nichols Hut across the Waiohine river valley. We agreed that it looked like a worthwhile trip and neither of us had been there so agreed to get it onto the trip card.

Janet, Graham & Yvette Cottam had traveled down to Otaki Forks the Friday night while I had promised to be there before 7:30 on Saturday morning. The day promised to be a beauty, warm and cloudless. On arriving at my companion's campsite I soon learned that staying in Palmy for the night was probably the best choice, it turned out that the Trampers had a group of young people for neighbours and they had partied all night....Janet was unimpressed to say the least.

Well we got our gear together and moved the cars to the overnight parking spot for safe keeping. The day really was nice and we wasted no time in getting off to Waitewaewae Hut. I have never done this trip and really enjoyed the track with the swing bridges and rail track, the early part of the trip is in fact on an old logging railway.

The only actual train track visible is the corner track, which is made of iron, and I had assumed that the straight sections were pilfered but Richard Lockett later told me that the straight sections were in fact made of wood! At the end of the rail track section of the tramp is an old steam engine, very cool.

From here we headed up Saddle Creek on our way to YTYY Hut. For myself I really enjoyed this part of the trip. I had heard stories of mud and bog holes etc but found it to be a nice tramp and would recommend it for an enjoyable overnight trip. We decided to take the river route to the hut once we reached the Otaki, it was very hot and the cool water felt great.

We stopped at hut for lunch and had a bit of a chat with a possum hunter from Tapanui in the South Island. After lunch it was up, up, up to Shoulder knob. First though we followed the Otaki River upstream a bit past a wonderful swimming hole that is well worth a visit. Yvette had it marked on her calendar for the return trip!

The tramp up to Shoulder Knob, made famous by Graham Peters who was left there by the Air force during a SAREX when their Helo broke while ferrying him there to take down a communications mast....was a hot affair.

We had a couple of rest stops on the way up and enjoyed the forest and views. Finally breaking out onto the tops we had fantastic views all around us....what a beautiful place indeed. Next stop Junction Knob.....but not before being buzzed by a couple of mad Gliders....very cool! They actually make quite a bit of noise. Janet and Yvette were up on Junction Knob and they said the Gliders were below them!!

Nichols hut is a great hut in a beautiful place and I would recommend it for a stay. The sign says it is maintained by the Kapiti Branch of the NZDA and it is in good shape.

We arrive at about 6:30 for an honest 10hr day. The next day dawned just as nice as the previous...two perfect days on the Tararua tops...bloody marvelous!! The plan was for Yvette and I to go back to Otaki Forks the way we came and for Janet & Graham to head over to Maungahuka Hut and come out on Monday.

Yvette and I headed off about $\frac{1}{2}$ hr before the others and had a good tramp along the tops taking photos of flowers and scenery. We

made good time and before long were heading down to YTYY at a fair clip. Before long we were over the swing bridge and Yvette was dead keen to get into the swimming hole for a cool down. I left her to it and went on to the Hut for a bit of lunch and a sit down.

Iron Gates Gorge 12 Feb By Warren Wheeler

So we took the shortcut behind the Big Rock and up through Pederson's Bush rather than swim the raging torrent in the gorge...although Nigel was tempted. The first one and a half hours were fairly easy along the sidle track, with views down into the Oroua River we would travel down later. There is an "active slip" on the zigzag climb out of the unnamed creek, but it seems to have settled down and is well marked. The Oroua River route is quite spectacular, with steep bluffs, deep green pools, and a different vista on every bend. There are numerous crossings, some rocky scrambles and plenty of rock-hopping to maximise the fun factor and provide a nice challenge without being arduous. Floods over the last couple of years have

changed the river-bed quite considerably in some places, but any pools are still no more than knicker depth or can be avoided by little up-and-around deviations. Hopefully the conditions will be more summery next time.
